


Kangaroo and Wallaby Class: Home learning schedule for Week Commencing 22nd June 2020

This week, we will be basing our home learning activities on the story What the Ladybird Heard. The story is about how a ladybird overhears two men planning to steal the prize cow from the farm where she lives. We have chosen this story as we are often inundated with ladybirds, their eggs and larvae at this time of year. The story also fits nicely with our transdisciplinary theme Sharing the Planet for Terms 5 and 6. Like last week we will continue to aim to develop being Principled and Thinkers from the Learner Profile. We will also take the opportunity to learn more about ladybirds, and base some maths ideas on their spots and other aspects of the ladybird stories!

<p>Day 1 Monday 22nd June - Links and Activities:</p> <p>English – Watch, or read What the Ladybird Heard.</p> <p>Draw a map of somewhere you know well like Hefty Hugh and Lanky Len do in the story. What do you think they would try to steal? Describe how you could stop them. You could talk about this, or write it on the plan! Perhaps you could design an amazing trap..</p> <p>Maths – Doubling. Draw 6 simple ladybird shapes and divide in half (see the example opposite). Explain that we are going to ‘double the amount of spots.’ Doubling means adding the same number again. Do this for all six ladybirds, starting with one spot.</p> <p>Keep these for tomorrow!</p> <p>Phonics - For a whole lesson, go to the Letters and Sounds youTube link (opposite) and choose a lesson. Alternatively, choose from a Phonics activity and video from Google Classroom.</p> <p>An easy phonics activity that you can do at home without needing to access the internet again is Eye Spy. If you can, write the number sentence underneath each one.</small></p>  </div>
<p>Day 2 Tuesday 23rd June - Links and Activities:</p> <p>English – Ladybird facts.</p> <p>There are some links to suitable websites in the notes section to look at - I like the Kiddle page the best as it has really good photos. Part of the Early Learning Goal for technology is knowing that information can be found online. Of course, you may have books about minibeasts at home which you may prefer to use. Some interesting facts about ladybirds include:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Ladybirds are a type of beetle. 2. Beetles are insects so they have 6 legs. 3. They can be called ‘ladybirds’ or ‘ladybugs’, ‘lady beetles’ or ‘coccinellid’ (their proper scientific name). 4. 5. Gardeners love ladybirds as they eat aphids.
6. Female ladybirds lay eggs on, or under, leaves. Ladybird larva hatch out of the eggs and, like the Very Hungry Caterpillar, have huge appetites. They consume vast amounts of aphids each day. try and look at a photo of a larva if you have never seen one - they are amazing to look at!
7. After about 2 weeks, the larvae pupate.
8. After another 3 weeks, adult ladybirds emerge.
9. Ladybirds can live between 1 - 2 years!


A **discussion** about the life cycle of ladybirds - talking, listening, commenting, asking questions, understanding - are all essential elements of the Communication and Language Early Learning Goals.

Maths – Halving. Yesterday, we doubled the amount of spots. Today, we will look at the same spots, but discuss 'half'. Count all of the spots on a ladybird and explain that the spots are shared on two parts of the ladybird. Each part has the same amount of spots as the other part. There are half of the spots in one part, and half in the other. Each half has the same amount. Later in school, the children will use this 'everyday language' to develop a deeper mathematical understanding of fractions.

Phonics - For a whole lesson, go to the Letters and Sounds youTube link (opposite) and choose a lesson. Alternatively, choose from a Phonics activity and video from Google Classroom.

Phonics Activity - watch, or sing, the alphabet song on YouTube. Next, go on an alphabet scavenger hunt. Can you find objects for every letter of the alphabet?

Day 3 Wednesday 24th June - Links and Activities:

English- Read or watch What the Ladybird Heard Next.

Oh no! Hefty Hugh and Lanky Len are back! This time they want to steal the hen to make money from selling the eggs! In the story, the goose makes up a story about the 'super-duper Snuggly Snerd.' Can you design a new animal? Perhaps it could include something from all of your favourite animals. I think my animal would have a fluffy fox tail, the body of a hairy pig, the head of a puppy, and the eyes of a lizard! Label your animal to help teach someone about your new creation.

Maths – Find a variety of coins to explore. It can be really good fun to make rubbings of coins using paper and crayons. The link shown opposite uses coin rubbing to colour in drawings of balloons. Another fun idea is to use foil to rub over coins. Whichever way you do it, you can develop a mathematical understanding in a number of ways:

1. Find the number on the coin - how many pence, or pounds, is the coin worth?
2. match the real coins with their rubbing. How are they the same? Do they have the same number? are they the same size? Are they the same shape?

Phonics - For a whole lesson, go to the Letters and Sounds youTube link (opposite) and choose a lesson. Alternatively, choose from a Phonics activity and video from Google Classroom.

Phonics game - have a bag of objects. Take one item out, say what the object is and segment it - There are different ways to do this. Some people 'pinch' the sounds, some move their hand down their arm as they say each sound. Others do 'robot arms'. Use small objects from home, or pictures cut out of magazines. Some objects that use the phonemes that we have taught include:

fork spoon hat sock pot pen cup mug stick twig book card toothbrush bag pip (apple) pin (safety).



Day 4 Thursday 25th June - Links and Activities:

English - In this story, the ladybird goes on holiday in London. Guess who she sees plotting to steal a monkey from the zoo...There are lots of animals in this story! Choose your favourite and draw them. What would they say to Lanky Len and Hefty Hugh? Draw a speech bubble for your words..

Maths – Draw out some empty ladybird shapes (no spots). Roll a die (dice) and draw that many spots on one side of the ladybird. Roll the die again and draw this amount on the other side. How many spots does the ladybird have all together?

Phonics - For a whole lesson, go to the Letters and Sounds youTube link (opposite) and choose a lesson. Alternatively, choose from a Phonics activity and video from Google Classroom.

Phonics activity: **Find the vowel.**

We usually spend time working on the vowel sounds in the middle of words as they can be the hardest to hear. Write the vowel sounds to refer to: **a e i o u**

Next, write out some words, but leave a space for the vowel sounds. You could use the objects from yesterday's phonics activity. For example, use a hat, pen, pin, pen, sock, mug. , Write them with spaces: **h t p n p n s ck m g**. Encourage your child to choose the correct vowel sound. and then write the word.

Day 5 Friday 26th June - Links and Activities:

English – Watch or read What the Ladybird Heard at the Seaside. Imagine you are at the seaside. Sometimes, I like to watch a relaxing beach scene on YouTube and imagine I am there feeling sand between my toes. Use an old envelope to write a 'postcard' home. What would you say? Remember all the phonemes we have learnt in Phonics to help you. There is a picture of a postcard opposite to help.

Maths - Beetle Drive. **Beetle drive** is an old favourite - a simple **game** requiring only paper, pencils and dice. A great **game** enjoyed by all ages. The aim of the **game** is to be the first player to draw a complete **beetle**. The body parts you draw are determined by the throw of the dice. See below for an example.



